



What Is the Meaning Behind Each of the Four Advent Candles?

Advent candles are lit in the weeks leading up to Christmas, but do you know what each candle represents? Each Advent candle has special religious significance.

"Advent" means the coming of Christ, or the second coming, so the period leading up to Christmas is known as Advent. It is the first season of the Christian church year. On each of the four Sundays preceding Christmas, an Advent candle is lit. The 4 candles of Advent names are hope, love, joy, and peace, representing the virtues Jesus brought us.

What Do the Four Candles of Advent Symbolize Together?

During Advent, we prepare ourselves spiritually for the anniversary of Christ's birth. But what do the Advent candles represent together?

The four Advent candles are arranged on a circular Advent wreath, with no beginning or end, reminding us of the eternity of God's love and the everlasting love we find in Jesus. Together the Advent candles are a reminder of God's promise to us of salvation through Christ. The wreath is placed in a prominent position in the home - at the front door or on a window sill so that all can see it, and can be a constant reminder of Advent.

Why Advent Candles Are Purple, Pink, and White?

The Advent candles' meaning is reinforced by the color of the candles. The order of Advent candle colors takes us from repentance to the celebration of Christ's birth.

The first two Advent candles are usually purple, which is a liturgical color. This is the period at the beginning of Advent when we are in repentance and contemplation of our sins. Why is the third advent candle pink, you may wonder?

Well, the meaning of the pink Advent candle is joy and comes before the final white candle, which represents Christ's purity and love.

The Four Advent Candles

First Advent Candle - Hope

The first candle symbolizes a shining light in

anticipation of the coming of Christ. It is usually a purple candle and can be called the Prophecy Candle. It represents God's forgiveness of man's sins. Purple is traditionally the most important of the Advent candle colors. It is the color of liturgical garments used for vestments and is associated with prayer, contemplation, repentance, and hope.

Second Advent Candle - Love

The second candle, or Bethlehem Candle, is also usually purple or violet. It reminds us of the Holy Family's experience in Bethlehem. The color of the second Advent candle is associated with royalty and reminds us that Christ is the "King of Kings." We await the coming of a new king from Bethlehem. Third Advent Candle - Joy

The third candle is the Shepherd's Candle, as we remember to rejoice in Christ's birth, like the shepherds on the first Christmas Eve. It is also called Gaudette Sunday from the Latin Philippians 4:4,5 "rejoice in the Lord always." The 3rd candle is usually pink or rose-colored. Pink is associated with joy, and it is on the third Sunday of Advent, that we turn from repentance towards the celebration of Christ's imminent birth.

Fourth Advent Candle - Peace

The final Advent candle marks the beginning of the final week before Christmas and is a time of prayer. It is also called the Angel's Candle and is a white candle representing purity, peace, and justice brought to the world by Christ. The white candle also reminds us that Christ is sinless and pure.

But more than that, they have shown tremendous love and support. They are my palate cleansers at the end of a sometimes hectic week. I come in an hour early, so, after the work is done, we are able to take time to share coffee and conversation. I don't think they will ever comprehend how much this time together meant to me.

Barry Schaefer was the first Pastor I worked for. His humor, dedication and love of the Amery community made working with him a delightful, comfortable partnership. Barry insisted that I attend his Bible study as part of my job. Then, on one occasion, Berry said he would be unavailable and asked if I would lead the study. The one occasion became several. Since, I didn't have a Christian background, I couldn't just show up to lead a discussion - I had to do research - lots of it. I think that was Barry's plan all along. Instead of a chore, the study became a passion. And, thanks to Barry's enthusiasm for podcasts, I am now hooked on them. Garth Shumacher was the interim pastor after Barry retired. He came as covid had closed down just about everything. Garth had the charge of providing pastoral services while complying with Covid safety guidelines and requirements. Often an interim has to "shake and wake" to prepare a church for change. Therefore, in this role, Garth was not everyone's cup of tea. However, I found him to be dedicated, compassionate and respectful. Garth consistently recommended books to guild me in my Christian path. When I had questions, Garth always listened and took time for discussions about my thoughts or doubts. He often recommended books which awoke my interest in non-fiction, Christian literature. I am still working through books and articles by the theologians Garth recommended.

And last, but not least of the pastors I have served, is **Dana Caldwell**, our current pastor. Her energy, wisdom, faith and enthusiasm have been a source of inspiration. Dana's journey to be here has not been smooth or easy. However, Dana never lost sight of her calling and persevered though many formidable obstacles. Her dedication to the congregation and her ability to touch hearts and minds through her sermons has made many of us want to grow and search for a deeper relationship with God. I will miss our discussions and her wisdom. And I will miss her laugh which tickles me to the core whenever I hear it.

To all the dear members of this church, I thank you for your warm smiles, encouraging words, and the countless ways you have enriched my life. Your presence has been a constant reminder of God's love and the power of a united community. Though I won't be your Church Lady, I will always hold you dear in my heart and will look forward to seeing you on Sundays. May God's blessings be upon each and every one of you.

Merrill church at heart of effort to aid North Carolina farmers

A member of St. Stephens UCC in Merrill is at the center of an effort to ship donated hay to farmers in a region of North Carolina that was devastated two weeks ago by Hurricane Helene.

Todd Frederick, owner of a manufacturing company in Merrill, got involved after learning from a friend who operates a dairy and cattle farm near Ashville, North Carolina, that Helene had destroyed crops in the area. The friend and his fellow farmers need hay to sustain their livestock.



St. Stephens posted a plea for donated hay to social media, and Todd went to work on the logistics, arranging for trucks to haul it to the affected farmers. The response? "It's been wild," said St. Stephens' pastor, the Rev. Mike Southcombe.

Thousands of hay bales have been donated already, mostly from Wisconsin, though farmers from as far away as Texas, Kansas, Arkansas and New York have contributed. St. Stephens has raised around \$13,000 to pay to transport the hay, though trucking companies have also offered time and trucks to the effort. The congregation is planning a fundraising dinner later in October.

The Wisconsin Conference donated \$1,500 to the effort.

"The generosity of these farmers is something to be celebrated," Mike said. "It does not surprise me, but it will always inspire and humble me."

In a post on the Facebook page of his company, FreMarq Innovations, Todd said the company had received more than 130 voicemail messages containing offers of hay. "There have been so many people involved in this process," he said, "We are so thankful for all of you who have supported in any way, from donating to sharing."

St. Stephens and the wider Merrill community have been affected, too. "It's a morale boost to see this devastation on TV and to know we're part of some of the recovery," Mike said. "We still have quite a few people in the congregation connected to dairy in some way. Just to be part of helping them down there – it's a tremendous gift that we can be part of that."

Social media and social good

The Merrill project is a testament to the power of social media to spread the word about a good cause. Pastor Mike Southcombe said that in the seven days after St. Stephens issued the appeal for donated hay, the original post received more than 579,000 views, and the St. Stephens Facebook page was visited 8,800 times. St. Stephens' website received more than 1,600 visits.

One of the jobs is to replace the fellowship hall with LED lights that can be dimmed; from the investment gains they are planning to distribute \$15,000.00 to non-profit organizations in the community. They are going to work with Missions & Social Concerns to help decide who will receive some of the money; the church workday was well attended, and a lot of work was accomplished. **Board of Christian Education**: Julie M reported the following: Firestarter's continues to meet on the 2nd & 4th Wednesdays; Breakfast Club has been well attended; Barry Tulkki is working on an intergenerational Christmas Program.

Board of Deaconate: Penny C reported the following: Barry T is working on a program for the Hanging of the Greens on November 30; the Christmas Program will be held during worship on December 8; Sunday, December 15 during worship will consist of primarily music.

Board of Congregational Giving: Pastor Dana reported that Beth Leonard and Mike Swank will be joining the committee in January; they are working on the wish list.

Board of Mission and Social Concerns: Pastor Dana reported they continue to do the monthly "Share the Share".

Pastor Report: Pastor Dana reported on the following: the 1st Chinese class has been completed and the 2nd is scheduled on December 10; there has been a letter of transfer received for membership; Potluck on Sunday, December 29 after worship; Christmas Eve Service will be on Tuesday, December 24 at 9:00 pm; the Chinese Dinner Fundraiser will be held on Saturday, February 1 with times to be determined; training for the Chinese Dinner Fundraiser will be held on January 19 at 1:30 pm; Looking ahead, Fall Festival 2025 will be help September 18-21; the Health and Happiness Walk and Block Party is scheduled on October 4, 2025; Rummage Sale ???; Pastor Dana will be on vacation 12/23/24 through 1/3/25 but will be doing worship on that Sunday; Leadership Retreat is scheduled for January, 4
